This website conforms to the principle website accessibility guidelines. To find out what we mean by this, please read the following passages of information.

What is Website Accessibility

Website Accessibility is about making sure websites are not created in a way that might inadvertently create barriers to accessing the content within them. This may make it impossible or difficult for some people to access the pages' useful content. These barriers can be the result of not using modern web principles within the underlying website code, or assuming that all people will 'see' the website the same way, whereas in reality, users of the website may be on a desktop, tablet or smart phone, etc..when viewing the website.

Accessibility across platforms

People view web pages on all kinds of different hardware and software:

Hardware

- PCs, laptops and Macs
- Personal Digital Assistants and smart mobile phones
- Tablets and web/note book computers

Software

- Web browser such as Internet Explorer, Google Chrome, Mozilla Firefox, Safari, Opera and others, and not necessarily the latest software release versions of these. Moreover, people with certain disabilities, such as dyslexia, blindness or partial sight, might use assistive software such as screenreaders or screen magnifiers to access web pages, or make adjustments to the settings on their browsers.

With this diversity in mind, we endeavour to accommodate this wide range of display methods to make sure that all of the web pages herein are flexible enough to adapt to these differing display environments as well as hardware/software requirements a user may have in order to view our website.

Printed copies of sections of the website can be requested in circumstances where digital accessibility is restricted or inaccessible.

Font sizes used on the website

It may be the case that the fonts used on the website are of insufficient size to be clearly legible, particularly for short or partially sighted users. If this is the case, we recommend that users of the website try the in-browser zoom methods inherent certainly in all modern browsers. In the case of viewing the website on a desktop computer, the page can be enlarged/zoomed by either using the Plus (+) and Minus (-) keys. In certain browsers the standard keyboard combination would be to hold down the control (Ctrl) key and then press the plus (+) or minus (-) keys to enlarge or shrink the screen respectively and where the keyboard combination of "Control + 0" returns the zoom back to the normal zoom level.

Again, whilst we endeavour to ensure that we use fonts of sufficient size to display the principal and salient information to all users, we cannot guarantee that all areas of the website conform to this minimum specification.
